Like the rest of the country, we were still limiting unnecessary contact with the public in an effort to keep our employees, as well as members of our community, healthy and Covid free.

Laramie County's proud history

- Laramie County is Wyoming's first and oldest county. We are firmly rooted in Wyoming's history and our western culture and way of life.
- The first Laramie County Sheriff took office in 1867 when Laramie County was still part of the Dakota Territory; at that time, Laramie County encompassed the entire Wyoming Territory. Wyoming did not receive its statehood until 1890.

**L.E.A.D. stands for LAW ENFORCEMENT ASSISTED DIVERSION and is a program that diverts misdemeanor non-violent offenders out of the criminal justice system for assistance with underlying mental health or substance abuse problems.



Other Department Priorities

Increased training and focus on responding to people in crisis. We are partnering with Cheyenne Regional Medical Center on a mental health co-response program that will have mental health professionals riding with deputies on patrol to assist with people experiencing a mental health crisis.

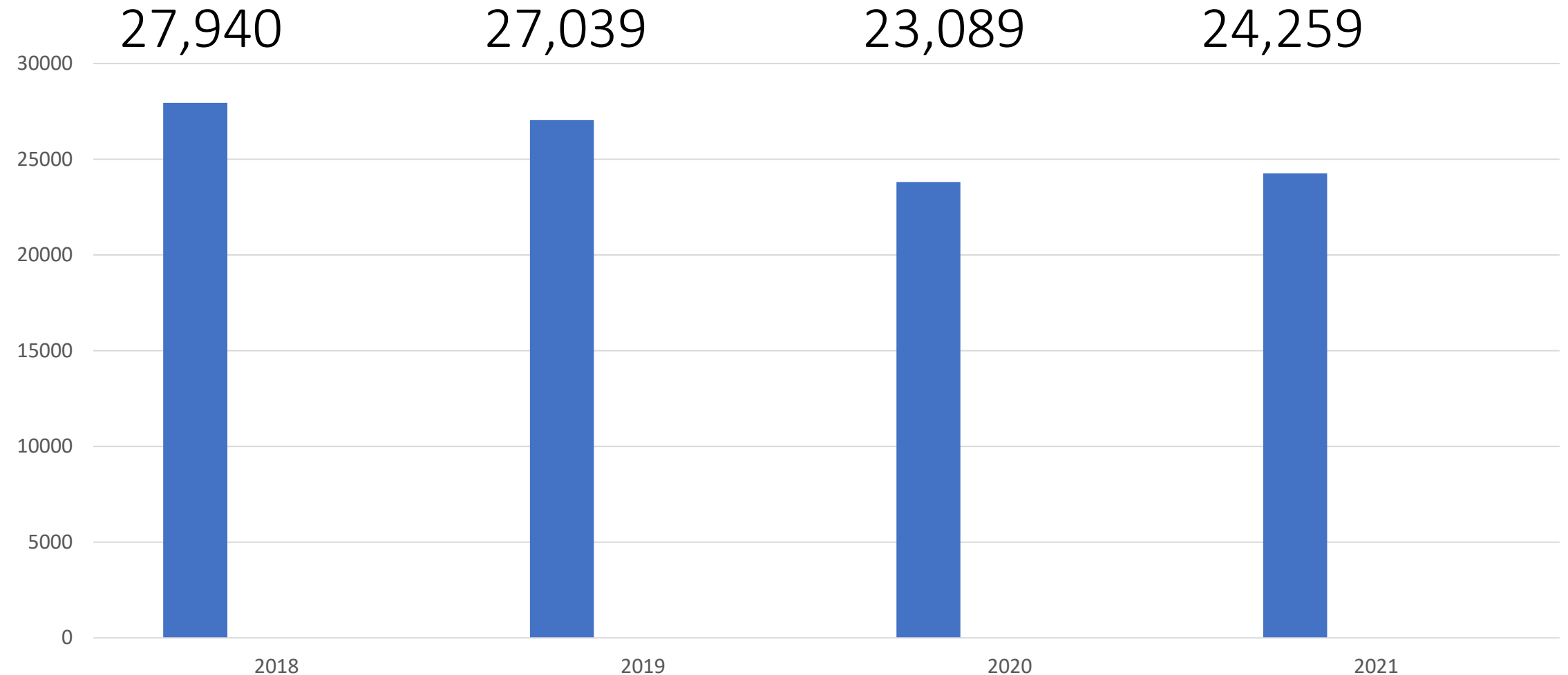
Constantly striving to improve both citizen and employee overall satisfaction.

Increasing mental health services in our detention facility

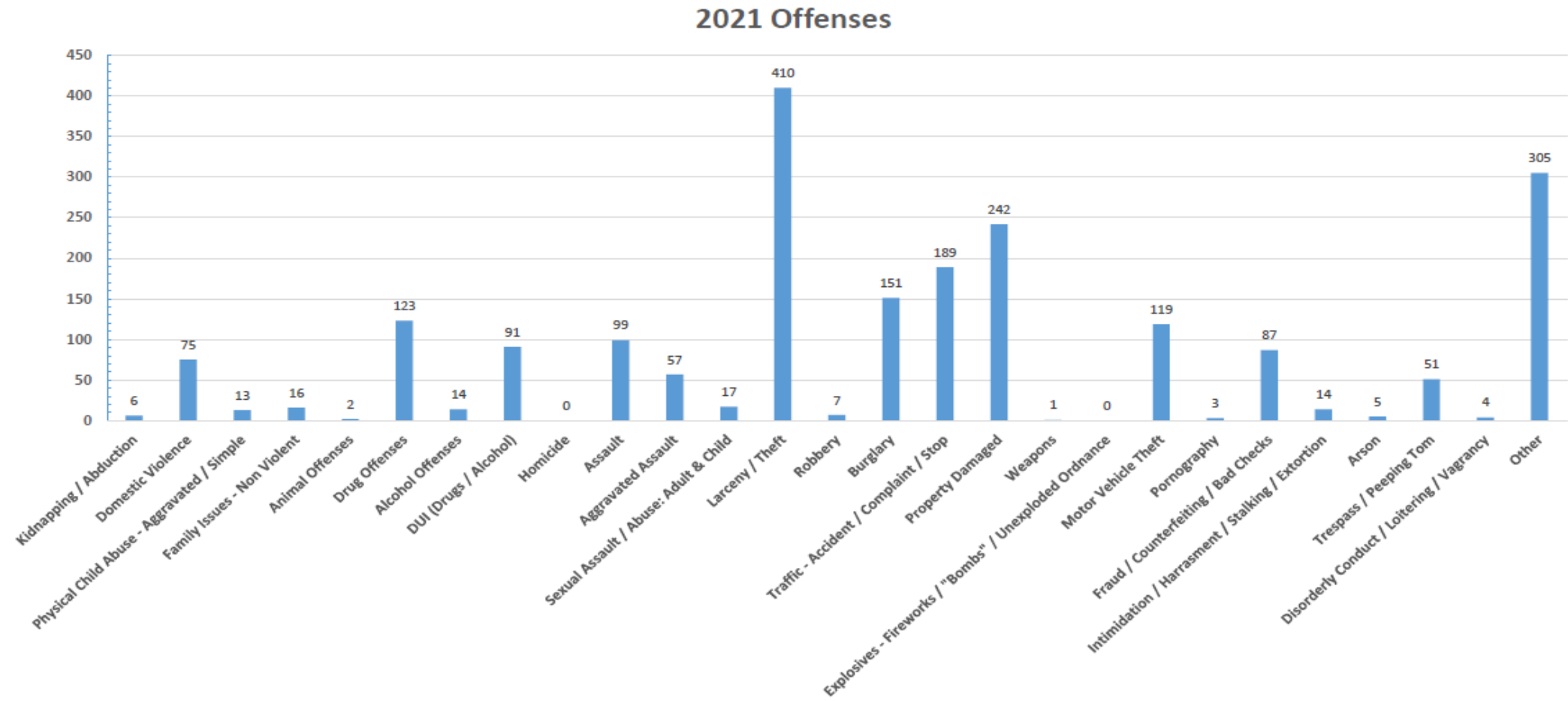
Working with our County Commissioners and Human Resources department to secure pay raises for all county employees.

Total Calls for Service (CFS) for 2021 compared to last 3 years shows a steady demand for law enforcement services in Laramie County.

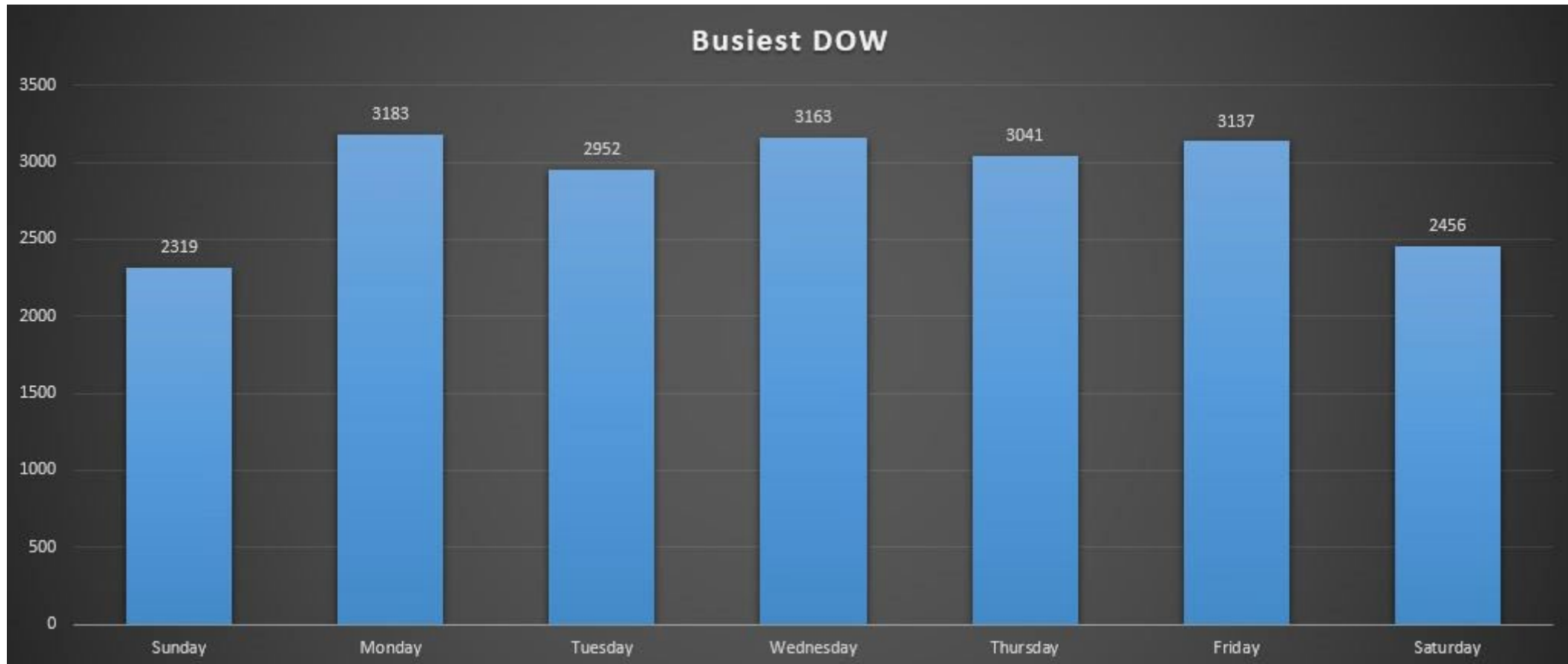

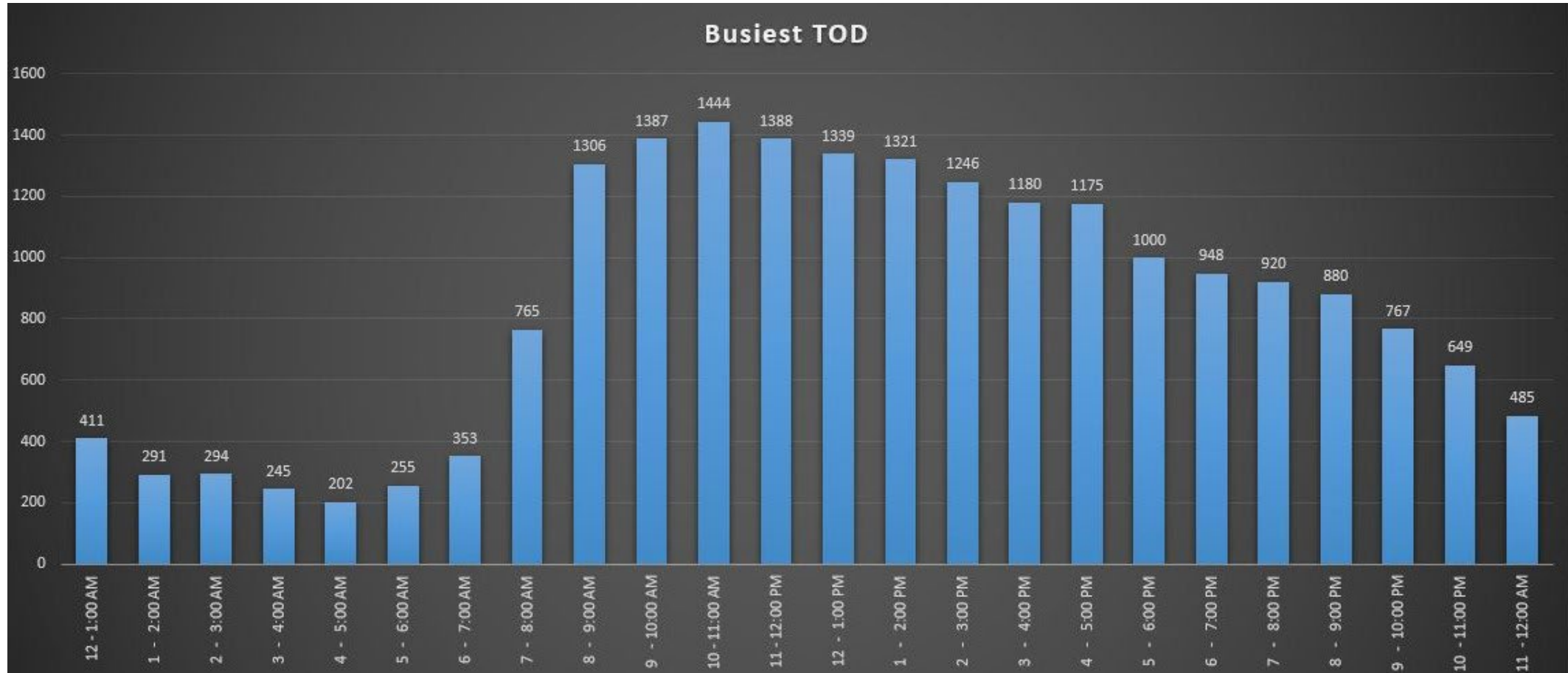
Total offenses for 2021, regardless of whether there was a suspect identified or an arrest made. This is not a sum of all calls for service, that information would be found in the calls for service totals.

PEEL'S PRINCIPLES

Accountability- Policing our own

PRINCIPLE 1 "The basic mission for which the police exist is to prevent crime and disorder."

PRINCIPLE 2 "The ability of the police to perform their duties is dependent upon public approval of police actions."

- Officer Complaints filed in 2021- 11

PRINCIPLE 3 "Police must secure the willing cooperation of the public in voluntary observance of the law so as to be able to secure and maintain the respect of the public."

PRINCIPLE 4 "The degree of cooperation of the public that can be secured diminishes proportionately to the necessity of the use of physical force."

PRINCIPLE 5 "Police seek and preserve public favour not by catering to the public opinion but by constantly demonstrating absolute impartial service to the law."

PRINCIPLE 6 "Police are only empowered to use force when it is necessary to secure observance of the law or to restore order only when the exercise of persuasion, advice and warning is found to be insufficient."

- Outcomes of the complaints:
- 6- Unfounded: No truth to the allegations

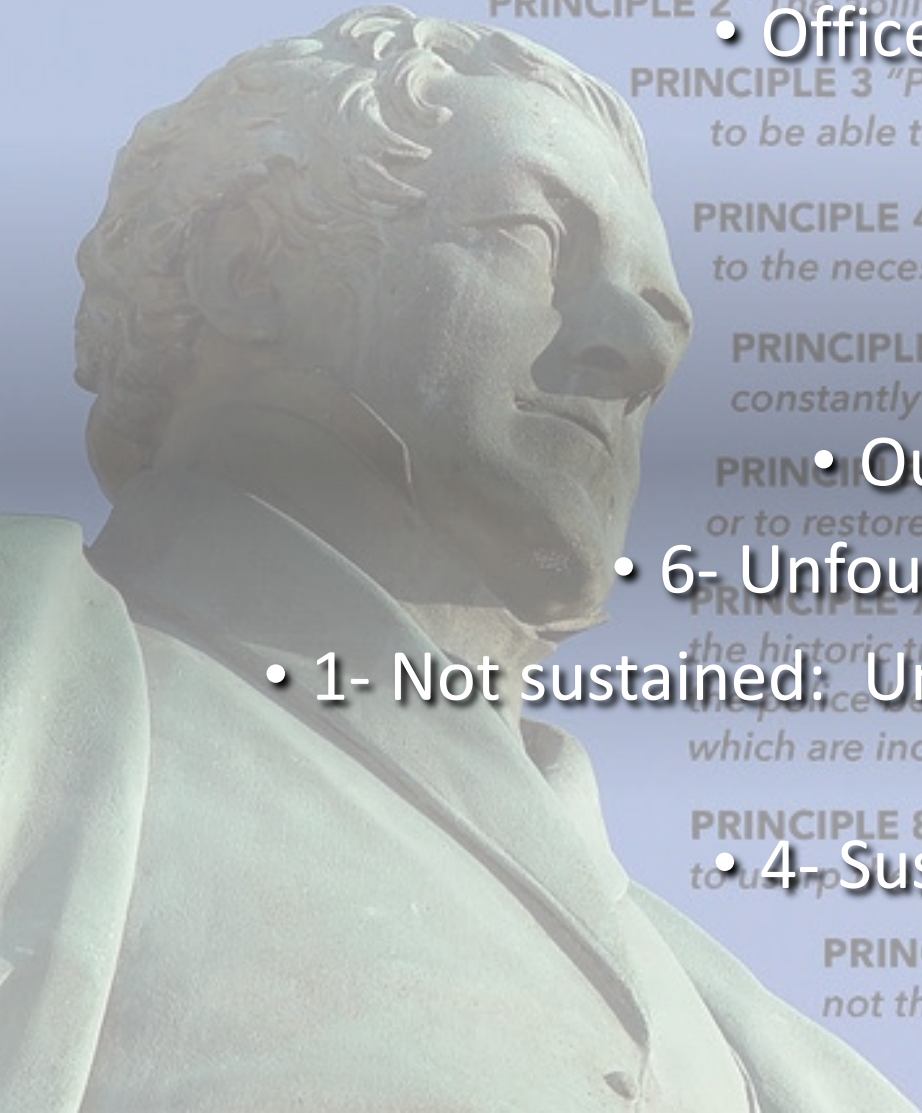
PRINCIPLE 7 "Police, at all times, should maintain a relationship with the public that gives reality to the historic tradition that the police are the public and the public are the police; the police being only servants of the public who are paid to give their whole attention to duties which are incumbent upon every citizen in the interests of community welfare and existence."

- 1- Not sustained: Unable to verify the truth of the matters under investigation

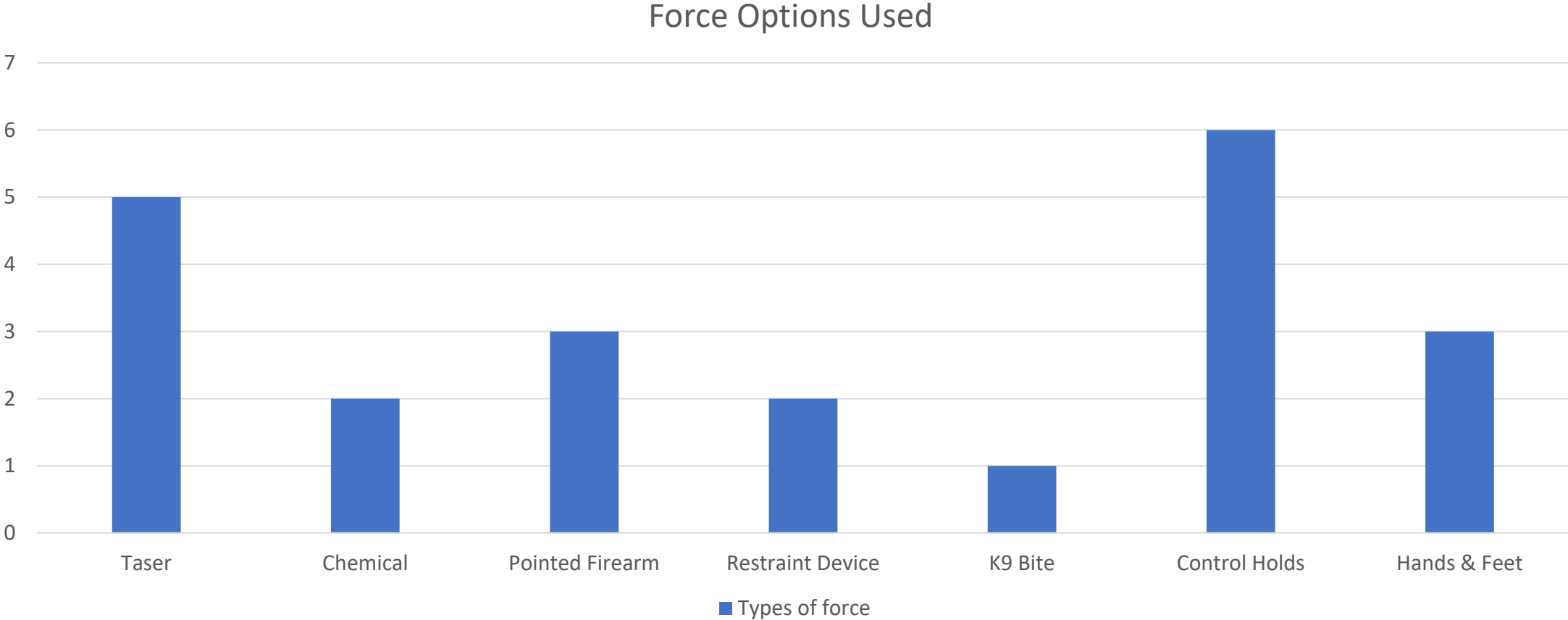
PRINCIPLE 8 "Police should always direct their action strictly towards their functions and never appear to usurp the powers of the judiciary."

- 4- Sustained: Allegations were true

PRINCIPLE 9 "The test of police efficiency is the absence of crime and disorder, not the visible evidence of police action in dealing with it."



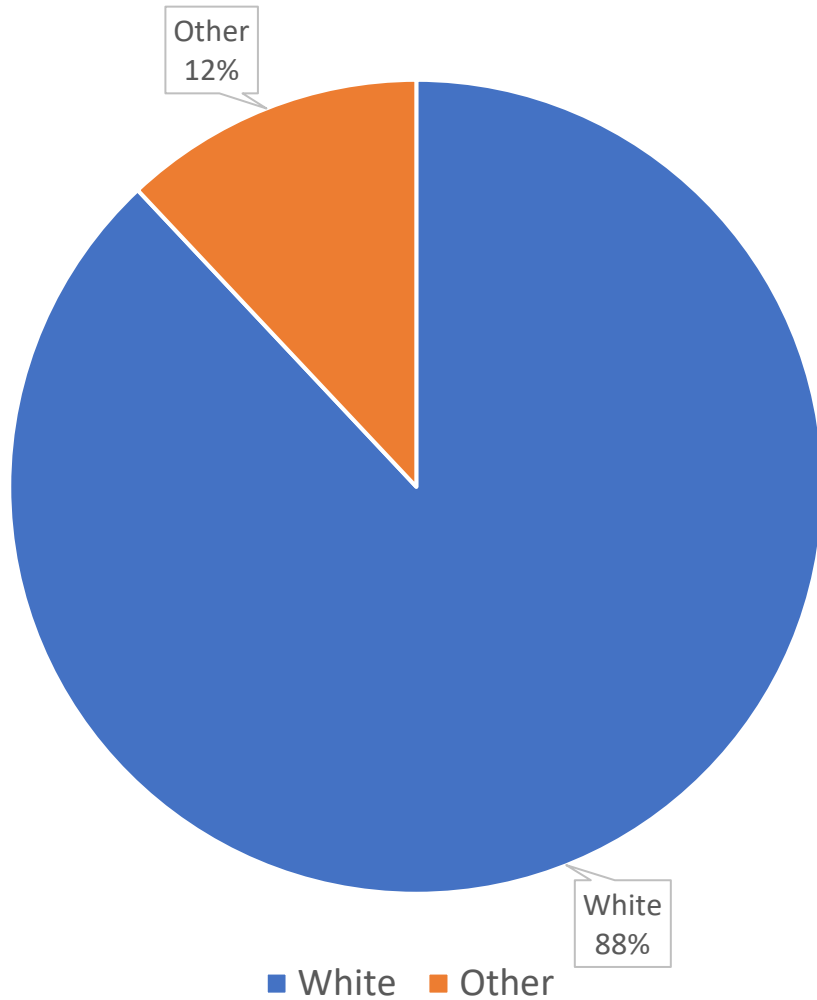
2021 Use of Force Incidents-Patrol Operations



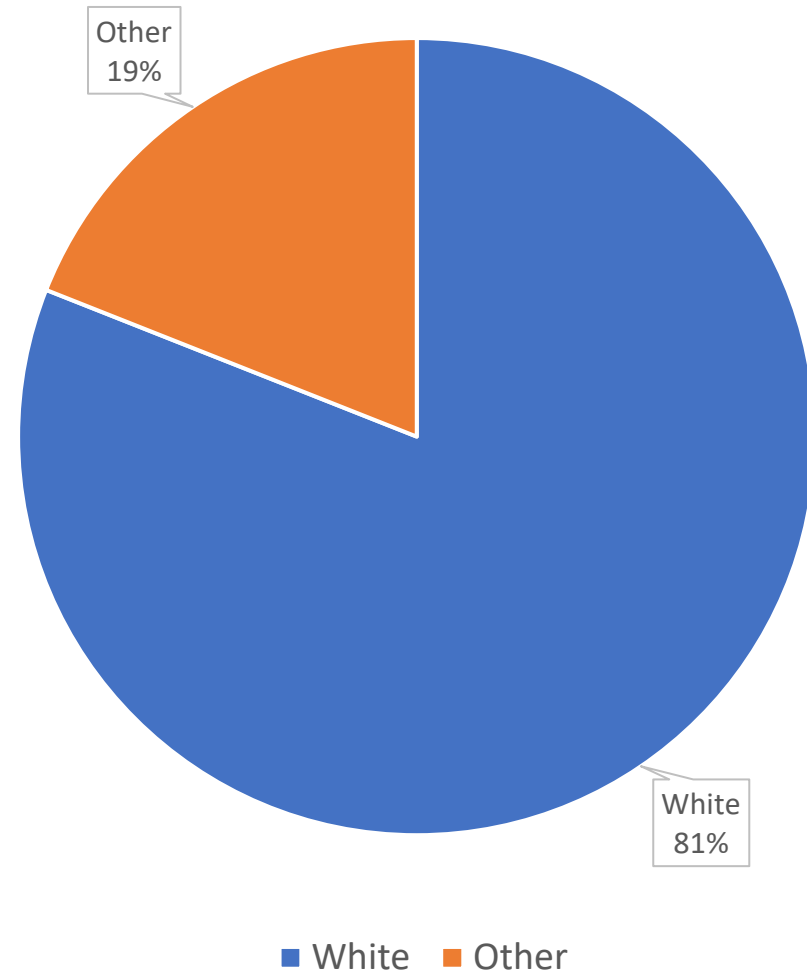
2021 Use of Force-Patrol Operations

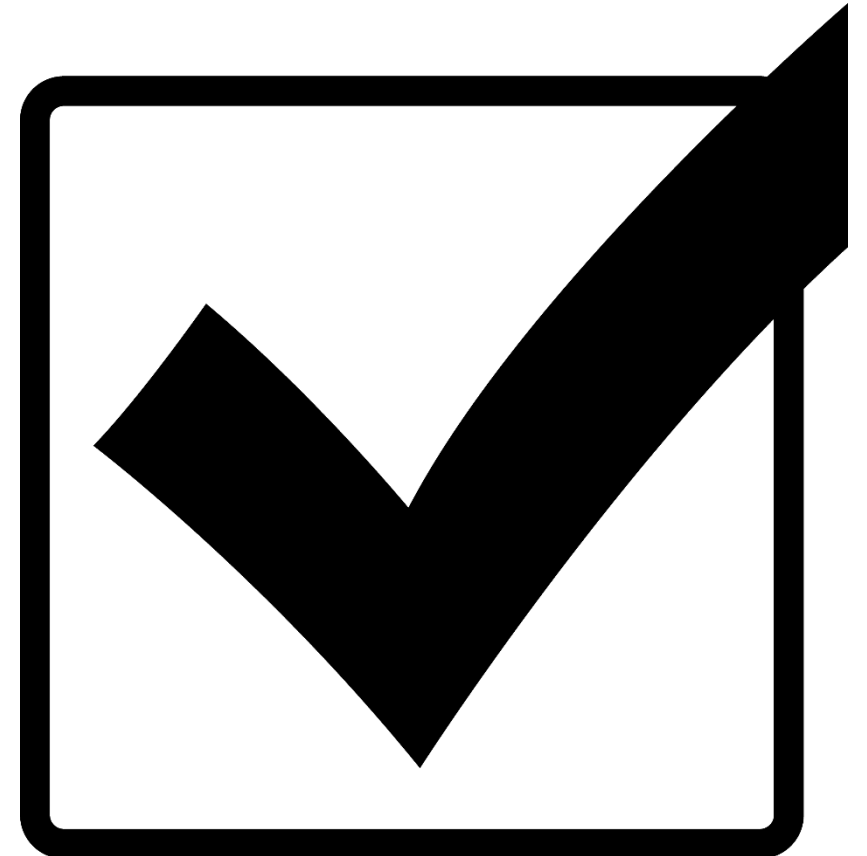




A few of our department accomplishments
